Summary



Finding 1

One of the most important parts of this survey was to see which projects, that are potential options for Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding, are ranked most preferable by TA residents. It was found that the New Footpath was rated most popular, followed by Traffic Calming when ranked by survey respondents. (S8/S9)

Finding 2

‘Traffic calming measures’ was ranked second both pre & post cost reveal. Reviewing the issues with speeding cars in the TA area may have some bearing on this:

- 92% of respondents had some concern about speeding
- Of whom 59% were very or extremely concerned
- 75% of respondents would like more traffic calming measures In TA
 - 69% thought that road markings were a good option

Finding 3

Interestingly, after presenting respondents with the approximate cost of each potential CIL funded project, their preference ranking of the projects was impacted. (S8/S9)



Finding 4

The suggestion of additional floral displays was positively received by three-fifths of respondents, with additional planters being the preferred option for more than half of the TA residents that responded to the survey.

Finding 5

Nine out of 10 respondents were aware of one or more local community groups, with awareness for the Tennis Club and Cricket Club being highest. The interest in volunteering for community projects was high, with over half of the respondents being happy to volunteer for one or more of the projects.

Finding 6

When asked to review the Christmas 2021 TAPC lights, almost half of the respondents were happy with the offering. Although a third would like to see more Christmas lights spread over the whole of the TA area in future.

Finding 7

Approximately half of the residents had some interest in an allotment, with over a quarter either very or extremely interested in the prospect of an allotment if available in the local area.

Background

Background to the survey



The Neighbourhood Plan (NHP)

- In 2018, the NHP began following surveys on key issues and community consultation, in order to identify areas of improvement.
- Part of the plans was to identify key projects and aspirations. This produced 8 projects which were supported within the Thorp Arch (TA) community, however some of these cannot be delivered for various reasons regarding current changes to the village.
- Despite this, the majority of the projects remain in contention and are candidates for Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds - a tariff system that allows local authorities to raise funds from developers undertaking new building projects in their area.
- The TA Parish Council (TAPC) has received significant budget to spend on infrastructure projects. However, it's important that the opinions of TA residents are collated through this survey before any spending priorities were determined.

Key Objectives

- To collect and analyse residents' opinions on a range of community aspects, so that TAPC can work to understand the priorities of Thorp Arch residents.
- To discover which potential Infrastructure projects are most preferred by Thorp Arch residents.
- For residents to sign up to the TAPC newsletter.

Demographics




There is a good spread of gender and age group, among participants.

Around three-fifths of participants live in the Northern part of the village.


With 50% of participants having lived in TA for 15+ years.

Almost three-quarters of participants have no children under 18 living in their household.




Gender




Household Composition

Number of Years Lived In Thorp Arch





Findings

Worthy causes for Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Investment

Base N=143

Potential projects in the running for future CIL investment were presented via the survey – each respondent then selected the projects they deemed worthy for CIL funding, from those originally proposed by the residents of TA.

The data shows that the New Footpath was the most commonly selected project, followed by Traffic Calming and a New Cycle Path. A Community Meeting Place is the least selected project.




'Other' suggestions included: Extra dog waste bins, resurfacing of road leading to Rudgate Park, improved drainage on roads.



Potential projects were ranked by respondents from most to least preferred, to identify the priorities that TA residents have for the future of the village.

The chart shows the mean score each project received overall, where those closest to 1 are the highest ranked. The data shows that the New Footpath project was most commonly placed highly in respondents' ranking.


Ranking of the projects by preference - S8 – Mean score







The approximate cost of funding needed for each potential project was then presented to respondents. They were offered the opportunity again to rank their preferences of which projects they deem most to least Important: The top two rankings projects stayed the same, however the New cycle path dropped by 3 places.

When comparing the outcomes from both of the ranking questions, we can see that respondents have ranked projects differently after seeing the approximate cost of each.

The highlighted cells show the overall top two lowest scores (*closest to first choice*), are chosen consistently over the two question (with and without cost.)

A 'new cycle path' had the biggest ranking change – going down in preference by .73 after the cost was revealed.



Concern regarding traffic


Residents reported their level of concern regarding traffic in TA, which found a majority of respondents reporting that they were extremely concerned. This corresponds with responses to the following question of whether an Increase of traffic calming measures is a preference of residents.

'Concern' level for speed-exceeding traffic In TA




Would residents like an increase of traffic calming measures In TA?



Potential traffic calming measures

After collecting initial opinions regarding traffic in TA, respondents then identified how preferable each of the following traffic calming measures would be to implement, as well as providing novel suggestions for other measures they would like to see in TA. Just over 50% of respondents had no additional comments to make. Reducing speeding traffic had the highest number of spontaneous comments, followed by repairing the roads, road surfaces, paths, etc.


Village Flower Displays

Preference for floral displays

TA currently has floral displays in various points throughout the village. TAPC wanted to investigate whether the residents of TA feel that there should be additional displays, and if so, what type and where. Only 28% of respondents had suggestions for the positioning of new planters/ plants, the highest number mentioned the green as an appropriate place.






Respondents selected which local groups they are currently aware of, to provide insight to the parish council of which groups may need more exposure within the community. The chart below presents the number of times a group was selected:

Just over two-fifths of the respondents did not wish to volunteer.

However:

- ✓ Almost half would collect litter (45%)
- ✓ Around a quarter would help with watering planters / baskets or with the neighbourhood watch
- ✓ With between 11%-13% of respondents Interested in other areas

Missing groups


Respondents also identified any groups that they felt were missing from TA community, which included the following:

1. Litter pickup volunteers
2. Cycling club
3. All Saints church mentioned
4. Numerous exercise types of clubs
Running, walking/ badminton, squash, yoga, bowling etc.
5. Hobbies and activities such as Art, drama, choir, band, chess, reading etc.
6. Social clubs for different ages / genders

Community Opinions

After Christmas 2021, TAPC were interested in gathering the perspective of those that live in TA regarding how the Christmas lights were displayed, in terms of quantity and general opinions. Whilst almost half of the respondents felt the amount of Christmas lights was adequate, a third would appreciate more lights spread over the whole of TA. Some residents suggested no / fewer flashing lights.






Residents of TA provided opinions about how they'd feel if allotments were made available to them for personal use, In terms of interest.

Around two-thirds of residents who participated in the survey were interested in subscribing to the newsletter.

Conclusions and recommendations



Overall the potential funded projects of most interest to the TA residents participating in the survey were:

1. **New footpath:** New footpath for a section of the Ebor Way on Wood Lane from Thorp Arch Park until the turning left off Wood Lane approx. ½ mile from the village back onto the Ebor way track - £97,500
2. **Traffic calming measures:** such as road markings and gateway features to signify the start of residential areas - £20,000
3. **Play area or equipment:** In the grassed and fenced area in front of Thorp Arch Grange near Leeds United Training ground which is owned by Leeds City Council (LCC) and open for public use - £5,000

Although the New cycle path was originally ranked third in terms of preference, when re-evaluated taking the cost into account - £177,000, the project dropped to 6th place.

This appears to indicate that respondents would like to spread the money available over a number of projects that cover a variety of areas. These projects would be greatly appreciated by much of the community.

Swift would recommend that the top 4 or 5 projects covered in the study be shown in more detail to TA residents to gain their final approval.

Overall the residents are engaged with the TA community issues and groups, and are willing to help but more could be done to raise awareness of existing groups (e.g. litter pick up group) and assist with the set up of any potential viable new community groups.

Background

The Neighbourhood Plan was made and formally adopted in 2018, following surveys on key issues, and community consultation including public meetings and engagement with neighbouring parishes, Leeds City Council and National Agencies. Its aim was to develop a shared vision for the future of the village. Full details of the Plan can be accessed by contacting Thorp Arch Parish Council via their website under 'Policies': <http://www.thorp-arch.org.uk/>

Part of the Plan was to identify key projects and aspirations. Eight projects were proposed and supported by the community. Some of these either cannot be delivered because of subsequent planning decisions (e.g., playing fields where houses are now situated), or will be delivered by the new housing developments (e.g., play areas).

The majority, however, remain in contention and are candidates for Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds. CIL is a tariff system that allows local authorities to raise funds from developers undertaking new building projects in their area. A 'meaningful proportion' is payable to Parish Councils. The Parish Council will receive around £300,000.00 over the next two years. CIL funding has to be spent within 5 years unless it is purposefully banked to provide a larger infrastructure scheme.

Recent development in the village means that the Parish Council will receive significant sums to spend on infrastructure projects. It is with this in mind that the Parish Council feel it is essential to gain the views and opinions of residents through the survey before any spending priorities are made.


